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NATO Watch Editorial:

Preparations for military strikes on Iran

In January, NATO Watch wrote a comment piece about the prospects of NATO intervention to prevent Iran blocking the international sea lane through the Strait of Hormuz or acquiring a nuclear weapons capability.

Despite reassurances that NATO would do neither, we pointed out that US, British and French warships were on patrol in the region and were there, according to a MoD statement, "to underline the unwavering international commitment to retaining rites of passage under international law". Ivo Daalder, US Ambassador to


NATO, affirmed that the waterway to the Middle East oilfields would be kept open "under every circumstance".

NATO's Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen clearly stated his position on Iran's nuclear programme in November 2011, "Let me stress that NATO has no intention whatsoever to intervene in Iran, and NATO is not engaged as an alliance in the Iran question". However, he declined to comment on reports, later confirmed by the Italian Defence Ministry, that Israeli air force jets participated in a long range bombing exercise from a NATO base on Sardinia the previous month.

Israel has a nuclear weapons capability, but it is not a 'recognised' Nuclear Weapon State (NWP) under the provisions of the Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT). Israel vehemently opposes the acquisition of an Iranian nuclear bomb. Iran is a declared Non-Nuclear Weapon State (NNWS) under the NPT.

In September 2011, Turkey agreed to host an early warning radar facing its border with Iran to support NATO's missile defence system (MDS) which has been justified on the need to combat a potential threat from Iranian missiles. Iranian officials claimed that such a move could only exacerbate tension in the region. Brigadier General Hajizadeh said, "We will target NATO's missile shield in Turkey and will then attack other targets."

However, Iran has long been in dispute with the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) and many analysts believe that it is developing the capacity to utilise its burgeoning civil nuclear facilities in a nuclear weapons programme. Iran



has consistently denied this but has blocked full access to suspected sites by IAEA inspectors. The uncertainty is adding to proliferation fears in the region. For example. Jean-Loup Samaan, the author of 'The Day After Iran Goes Nuclear' (published by the NATO Defense College in Rome) says that NATO will have to strengthen its defence guarantees with Middle East partners to discourage them looking for solutions', 'alternative including seeking to acquire their own nuclear weapons. Samaan advocates more war games, joint exercises

and even the deployment of nuclear weapons in countries party to NATO's Mediterranean Dialogue and Istanbul Cooperation Initiative forums.

Rasmussen has tried to reassure Iran that it has no reason to be concerned about NATO's deployed MDS, arguing that it is not directed against any specific state, merely against the threat of missile attack. Iran need only be concerned about missile defence if it planned to attack a NATO territory. In addition to the X-Band radar now deployed at Kurecik in eastern Anatolia, NATO plans to announce at the Chicago Summit that forward-deployed troops will soon be protected by an 'interim' MDS.

Viewed from Iran's perspective, one can see why they might not be reassured by what they can see happening on the ground rather than by what they hear from inside NATO circles, even more so following the Pentagon's recent announcement of preparations for military strikes on Iran if diplomacy and sanctions fail to secure compliance in the nuclear field. Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said that such planning had been ongoing for 'a long time', and that a unilateral strike on Iranian facilities by Israel would be less effective than one carried out by the US. Panetta had earlier told a pro-Israeli lobby that, "we do not have a policy of containment, we have a policy of preventing Iran from acquiring nuclear weapons".

Meanwhile, the IAEA's latest report on Iran's nuclear programme is not going to be helpful in reducing tensions as too many questions remain unanswered. The inspection team led by IAEA Deputy Director Herman Nackaerts requested a visit to Parchin where it is believed that a large steel vessel installed in 2000 could be being used

of explosive testing for warhead components. Permission to inspect the site was denied. The IAEA also asked for а detailed statement about the possible military dimensions of Iran's civil nuclear programme. Any suggestions of such dual use facilities or diversion were dismissed by Iranian officials as unfounded allegations. A request to be informed about the work of a former soviet nuclear weapons scientist and his Iranian students was also rejected. Iran again declined to implement the IAEA Additional Protocol and the IAEA concluded:

.....Iran has not fully implemented its binding obligations, as the full implementation of these obligations is needed to establish international confidence in the exclusively peaceful nature of Iran's nuclear programme.


While the IAEA Board of Governors was meeting in Vienna to consider Nackaerts' report, the US Navy was been increasing its military capabilities in the Persian Gulf according to Admiral Jonathan Greenert, Chief of Naval Operations. Pentagon strategists are apparently concerned that Iran may deploy fast-moving attack boats against existing and new US warships which would now be equipped with infrared surveillance equipment and short-range artillery and missiles.

While there are reports of a further effort at diplomacy in order to try and resolve the dispute over Iran's nuclear programme and to keep the Strait of Hormuz open, those calling for direct action are becoming more outspoken and military deployments in the region proceed apace. If it comes to intervention, our final question is still germane. Will it be NATO-led or a coalition of the willing?

Smart Defence? Not in Greece (or the United States)

According to recently-released European Council data on arms licences granted by member states, EU countries sold Greece over €1 billion of arms at the same time as negotiating its first bail-out



back in 2010. While France was by far the biggest seller, with €871 million of aircraft, missiles and defence electronics. pro-austerity advocates the Netherlands and Germany together sold almost €90 million of mostly electronics and ground vehicles. An anonymous aide to the then Greek leader, George Papandreou, said, "No one is saying 'Buy our warships or we won't bail you out.' But the clear implication is that they will be more supportive if we do".

Greece remains one of the biggest defence spenders in NATO - over the past 10 years its military budget has

stood at an average of 4% of GDP, more than £900 per person. This is largely due to perceived threats from NATO ally Turkey and from illegal immigration. Paul Hayden commenting in *The Guardian* said, "One cannot help but speculate that if Greece's military spending had been reined in sooner, it would not be experiencing the dramatic crisis it is going through now".

In a previous editorial we warned about the small print in NATO's Smart Defence initiative: an attempt to buck the trend in European defence cuts by achieving 'more with less' through prioritization, specialization and cooperation. Restructuring Greece's oversized military would seem the most logical and smartest place to make such a start. In fact, as Paul Hayden points out, "if it had only spent the EU average of 1.7% over the last 20 years, it would have saved a total of 52% of its GDP – meaning instead of being completely bankrupt it would be among the more typical countries struggling with the recession".

A similar story, but on a much grander scale also applies to the United States, where austerity liberalism and anti-government conservatism, have so far failed to dent a bloated Pentagon budget. According to Lawrence Korb, former assistant secretary of defence in the Reagan administration and now one of the foremost proponents of deeper cuts in the US military, the 2012 defence budget is slated to shrink by "not one penny". And he rightly concludes, "It is time for DOD, the administration and Congress to stop playing games and begin to bring defence spending under control as part of our overall plan to cut the burgeoning deficit. Our security depends on it".



An Alliance without a bicycle is like a man without a fish

What does the Father of Science Fiction,

H.G. Wells, have in common with NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen? Answer: a shared love of the bicycle.

"Every time I see an adult on a bicycle", the pacifist sympathiser Wells wrote, "I no longer despair for the future of the human race". The NATO Secretary General, an avid mountain biker, also used a cycling metaphor to extol the virtues of the not-quite-so-pacific leaning Alliance in his recent speech at the Brussels Forum. "The key to success on a bike", he said "is to keep it in a regular, forward movement, be it uphill or downhill, and the same goes for our transatlantic Alliance". With the wind obviously in his hair, he continued, "And another key to success on a bike is balance.... the right balance is also the key to the continued success of our NATO Alliance".

Bike riding is a skill easily learned and not easily forgotten, but as every cyclist knows, falling off is never a fun experience. The NATO Secretary General knows this only too well, having suffered a "serious fall" and fracturing his left shoulder while mountain biking in Brussels in November last year.

And as the American cyclist Lance Armstrong said, "If you worried about falling off the bike, you'd never get on". Since NATO has played "a major role in guaranteeing peace in the Euro-Atlantic area for over sixty years", we wish the Secretary General every success in his quest to rebalance the transatlantic partnership. Especially given that the consequences for a fall, could make

H.G.Wells' War of the Worlds seem like a bike ride in the park.

Book Review:

The Transatlantic Bargain

A joint study by the National Defence University's Centre for Transatlantic Security Studies, Washington, DC, and the NATO Defence College, Rome (January 2012)

To its credit, the opening pages of this discussion document lay out the problems facing NATO and call for a fresh look at the relations between the United States (and Canada) and its European Allies and partners.

Introducing the thirteen contributing authors who address specific issues in detail, we are told that NATO's image in confronting the Soviet Union, ending ethnic cleansing in the Balkans and in helping Central and Eastern Europe to reintegrate with the rest of Europe is generally positive. We are also reminded that the original ethos of the transatlantic bargain was that each side of the Atlantic divide would willingly sacrifice a bit to the other side for the benefit of the whole.

Then three broad and sometimes competing perspectives are outlined for the reader. Firstly, that post-Cold War debate on the way forward for NATO could have undone the bargain. Secondly, there were those who emphasised the commonality of interests while focusing on the need to challenge 'new threats'. Thirdly, there was the viewpoint that countries would remain within NATO as long as it served their own national interest, particularly if Europe was permitted a greater voice in decision making.

Herein lays the rub! European governments were content to maintain the solidarity line in principle while reducing defence spending and while the US continued to set the agenda and carry the bulk of expenditure burden. And worse, "European publics became more disenfranchised from a NATO that seemed divorced from their sense of their own national interest".

While NATO rhetoric followed the logic of the modernising second approach to the problem, transatlantic relations were increasingly no longer the most important organising factor in national security policy.

NATO's Strategic Concept was updated in 1991, 1999 and 2010 and each consolidated the move away from traditional military deterrence and

defence to issues of crisis management, peacekeeping, security partnerships, cybersecurity measures and sea-lane protection. But none of these new measures re-established the 'transatlantic bargain', apparently.

The call has gone out, in the politest possible terms, for Europeans to re-commit to NATO, and not just politically this time. The hardware capability gap must be bridged and burden sharing must become a reality. It's time for the Europeans to front-up and 'we' are going to be called to account in Chicago in May, it would seem, based on what Dr Karl-Heinz Kamp and





Ambassador Kurt D. Volker have to say in their 'chapeau paper'.

The following nine contributors, six American and three European authors, make their individual contributions under three broad headings, 'What has the Transatlantic Bargain Been and Evolved into Today?', 'What would a New Transatlantic Bargain Look Like?' and 'What is NATO's Role in a New Transatlantic Bargain?'. They are generally informative and sometimes insightful and will be a useful reference for those who follow developments within NATO as an academic exercise.

However, it is left to Dr Charles L. Barry to draw the disparate threads together in his Epilogue and conclude that the Transatlantic Bargain "must not be allowed to grow weak or simply endure. It must be nurtured, exercised and strengthened". He outlines six basic commitments which he asks those gathered in Chicago in May "to make and keep in a time of austerity" in order to build on them in an improved economic climate.

Undoubtedly, the 'capability gap' and 'burden sharing' calls will run up against the 'facts' that the US pays 75% of the cost of NATO operations and that few European members meet the NATO defence spending target of 2% of GDP. This means that the 'reality gap' between current funding and agreed activities in the 2010 Strategic Concept is unlikely to be bridged.
